Strengthening ROK-US Relations: Increasing Funding for Joint Military Exercises and Coordination

Be it enacted,

Line 01: The United States reaffirm its military cooperation with the Republic of
Line 02: Korea (ROK) under the ROK-US Mutual Defense Treaty (1953) through
Line 03: greater commitment for joint military exercises and coordination in the
Line 04: Pacific East Asian Region. Recognizing the rising threat of the People's
Line 05: Republic of China (PRC) against US interests in East Asia, the United States
Line 06: will increase spending toward the country in the next three years by at
Line 07: least approximately 2 billion USD compared to spending levels between
Line 08: 2016-2019, for a spending increase of around 15% to 15.4 billion USD. The
Line 09: United States will also sponsor the creation of two additional military bases
Line 10: in the ROK within South Jeolla and Jeju Island facing the East China Sea to
Line 11: provide additional security against the Chinese threat.

Line 12: The ROK-US Mutual Defense Treaty (1953) calls for the US to provide aid to
Line 13: South Korea in times of external armed attack and permission for US troops
Line 14: to be stationed in the country. Joint military exercises between the United
Line 15: States and Republic of Korea will be defined by greater naval drills within
Line 16: the Yellow and East China Sea and guideline precautions involving nuclear
Line 17: threats from the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK).

Line 18: The Department of Defense (DOD) of the United States will oversee these
Line 19: new programs, constructions, and joint foreign military spending.
Line 20: A. The Force Education and Training (FET) will handle future plans
Line 21: regarding joint-military exercises.
Line 22: B. The Department of Army, Navy, and Airforce will also play a role in
Line 23: deployment and stationing throughout the Korean Peninsula.
Line 24: C. U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) will distribute all
Line 25: spending toward foreign nations including that to the ROK.

A Bill to Implement the Practice of Assisted Euthanasia to Improve the American Healthcare System.

Be it enacted,

SECTION 1. Assisted Euthanasia will be legalized by the federal government, and all states and provinces residing within the union of the United States will recognize assisted euthanasia as an end-of-life care option for terminally ill patients.

SECTION 2. This bill refers to assisted euthanasia, the process in which a terminally ill patient can request physician assisted death to relieve prolonged pain and suffering if they are projected to pass within 6 months. This bill will not affect the states' legislation concerning assisted suicide, in which the requestee is seeking physician assistance to die even though they do not have a pre-existing condition that has been documented through a medical professional.

SECTION 3. The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) will be the main department responsible for upholding this bill and its policies on the federal level. The United States Public Health Service (USPHS), which operates inside the DHHS, will implement this new policy throughout all states. When implemented, assisted euthanasia will be regarded as an option in end-of-life care for terminally ill patients, and be considered legal national.ly.

SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect March 8, 2024. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Implement Restorative Justice in Prisons

Be it enacted,

SECTION 1. Restorative justice practices shall be incorporated into the U.S. penal system as an alternative method of addressing crime, focusing on repairing harm, fostering accountability, and encouraging rehabilitation over punitive measures.

SECTION 2. For the purposes of this bill, the following terms are defined:

"Restorative justice" refers to a system of justice in which the emphasis is placed on repairing harm caused by criminal behavior, involving direct participation from the victim, the offender, and the community.

"Victim" refers to any individual who has directly suffered harm or loss due to a criminal offense.

"Offender" refers to any individual who has committed a criminal act and participates in restorative justice processes..

SECTION 3. (a) The Department of Corrections (DOC) shall oversee the implementation and enforcement of restorative justice programs.

(b) The DOC will establish standards, guidelines, and resources to ensure the effective integration of restorative justice practices into the criminal justice system at the federal and state levels.

SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Enhanced Emergency Response and Preparedness Act

Be it enacted,

SECTION 1. The United States will establish additional FEMA regions and strategic emergency supply storage facilities to improve disaster response times and resource distribution.

SECTION 2. A. FEMA regions will be expanded from the current number to no fewer than fifteen, with locations determined based on population density, historical disaster data, and geographical vulnerability.

B. Strategic emergency supply storage facilities will be established and stocked with essential disaster relief resources, including:

Non-perishable food and potable water.

Emergency medical supplies and equipment.

Temporary shelter materials.

Fuel and power generation resources.

Communication equipment for disaster response teams.

C. Supplies shall be regularly inspected and replenished to maintain usability and effectiveness.

SECTION 3. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), in coordination with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), will oversee the implementation of this bill, ensuring the proper allocation of resources and coordination with state and local agencies.

SECTION 4. The funding for this initiative will be appropriated from the Department of Homeland Security's budget and supplemented by emergency preparedness grants. State and local governments shall be eligible for federal assistance in establishing auxiliary storage sites.

SECTION 5. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Line 01: SECTION 1. The enactment of this bill will legalize assisted euthanasia

Line 10: C. Terminal Illness. An incurable and irreversible illness that has been medically
Line 11: confirmed by a physician and is expected to result in death within six (6) months,
Line 12: regardless of the use of life-sustaining treatment.

Line 13: D. Qualified Healthcare Professional. A physician or other professional licensed
Line 14: by the state to diagnose, treat, or manage health conditions, authorized to
Line 15: prescribe medication, and who is in good standing with the relevant licensing
Line 16: board.

Line 17: E. Informed Consent. A voluntary decision by a competent adult patient, free
Line 18: from coercion, based on a clear understanding of the nature of the illness,
Line 19: treatment options, risks, benefits, and potential outcomes of any choices made.

Line 20: SECTION 3. A. The Secretary of Health and Human Services, in consultation
Line 21: with relevant state agencies, shall issue any regulations necessary to carry
Line 22: out this bill by no later than six (6) months after the date of enactment.

Line 23: B. Any physician with the necessary tools who denies assisted euthanasia to
Line 24: a qualified client will face civil liability for medical malpractice.

Line 25: C. Any person or organization found to be in substantial non-compliance with
Line 26: this act may be subject to appropriate federal or state penalties, including
